FOREWORD

Careers guidance for young people has never been more important. With nearly one million young people unemployed in the UK and businesses vocal about the skills gap they face when recruiting at entry level. To help schools and young people access the support and information they need to improve their skills, the third annual National Careers Week (NCW) took place from 4 to the 8 March 2013, organised by Careersinfo in partnership with Barclays and supported by the National Apprenticeship Service and The Department for Work and Pensions.

NCW is a UK-wide celebration of careers information, advice and guidance, developed to encourage education providers to bring together students, local employers and advisers to provide careers activities. It aims to inspire schools, academies and colleges to offer careers advice and guidance, highlighting the free resources and support available, while at the same time, inspiring employers to connect with young people.

During the week over 1,500 schools, academies and colleges signed up to provide more than 1.1 million students the support they need to make informed choices about their first step on the career ladder. It is estimated that 25,000 free NCW resources were downloaded during the week including videos, case studies and information about the world of work. You can see the full infographic to the left of this text.

Activities during the week in participating schools included special guest speakers, day trips out to local employers, 'build-a-career' workshops, CV writing exercises, and even fashion shows demonstrating 'what and what not to wear at job interviews'. Malet Lambert School in Hull was one of the most active during National Careers Week 2013 with over 30 careers activities for students to participate in across a variety of subjects. Stephen Logan is the Head of Careers at Malet Lambert and a big supporter of NCW. Stephen suggested that the activities schools provide during NCW could help them meet their Ofsted requirements to provide impartial, independent and external careers guidance for their students, and says that preparing young people for employment is vital in schools. We are so happy with Malet Lambert's involvement this year.

The Hull Employability Charter was brought about as a direct result of the Hull Building Schools for the Future Programme and the desire from Hull City Council and those behind the programme to ensure a legacy in skills and training was left. 
MONDAY'S EVENTS

Every year group had the chance to see one of the speakers on this day including Action Jackson, Engaging Education, Andy Barber, Jacqui Bruce, Mike Cargill, Sam Whitaker and Phil Benson. Engaging Education delivered a session on Monday morning, spanning 3 lessons, to test every enterprising skill possible. The task, focused around the appropriate use of literacy, helped students to identify their future career path and write about it in a concise and appropriate way.

The team at Engaging Education have taken away all the documents that were produced by the young people and turned it into a publication about Malet Lambert students, careers and aspirations. Tuesday saw the return of Action Jackson in a full day special event. 4 sessions for years 7-10 focused on motivation, inspiration and being the best at whatever you do. Action Jackson got students up on their feet and dragged them right out of their comfort zones to boost their confidence and teach them what it takes to put yourself ahead of the competition.

Action Jackson said; "The move towards "Independent Learning" requires a different level of motivation and skill and this program takes the students through the mental transition and what is required for them to perform at their peak. The FIXUP culture is one of fun, creativity, and inspiration conveyed with a high level of integrity."

Whilst some intense motivation was taking place in the hall, our other speakers, Jon Moss, Amy Blenkiron and Daniel Gray (see page 8) spoke about entrepreneurship, higher education and interview techniques. A fun filled day gave Malet students the chance to hear local business people speak about their field of work and how progression into jobs is not always as easy as it seems. Speakers included Sam Whitaker. Chief Exec. of Esteem, Kate Carroll, Marketing Manager at SPS Group and Hedley Aylott, CEO of Summit Media, broken up with in your face motivation from Action careers Jackson and the Fix-Up Team (even a little dancing to Thriller and Gangnam Style!)





Given our plans to become the UK's Energy Estuary, we also gave 20, year 9 students the opportunity during National Careers Week to get involved in an engaging, hands-on wind turbine design, build and operate activity with HETA and The Employability Charter Freedom Centre. With remote data capture feeding power into a virtual Supergrid, this session really engaged students and helped to highlight local emerging employment opportunities.

Pretty pictures and fancy write ups are a great way of showing just want went on during Careers Week 2013, but what did the young people involved actually think?



76% of students said yes.




"Mr Motivator."

100% of students said yes. 97% of those students also said that they would benefit from seeing him again.





82% of students said yes.




"The Real World."
