Leading the field

Malet Lambert School has been recognised as one of the best schools in the country for student progress at GCSE and shortlisted for an award by SSAT (The Schools Network).

A recent in-depth analysis of official Department for Education data on all state-funded schools in England by SSAT - the national schools' membership organisation for improvement and collaboration, identified Malet Lambert's success.

The school sits in the top 20% of schools nationally for progress made by pupils between key stage 2 results at primary school and their GCSE results at age 16.

This qualifies Malet Lambert to receive an SSAT Educational Outcomes Award, which will be presented at a regional celebration ceremony in June.

Sue Williamson, Chief Executive of SSAT, added her congratulations to Malet Lambert on their exciting news.

She commented, "Malet Lambert School should be congratulated for their exceptional achievement. They have proved themselves to be leading the field in improving GCSE outcomes for their students.

"There is so much good practice that this school could share, and I hope many schools will join us at the celebration ceremony for the chance to network and share strategies with award-winning schools.

"These results are testament to the commitment and hard work of the students, teachers and leadership team at Malet Lambert School, and show what can be achieved when skilled teachers have high expectations and ambition for every young person."

Packing a punch




Two Year 7 students have been karatechopping their way to success as members of Hull and East Riding Karate Club.

Ellie-May, who is graded as a green belt, currently holds the title for Under 12 Northern Open Champion and has also won gold in her category for the last three competitions she has attended.

Purple belt Mia won a bronze medal for her solo routine at the Northern Open, but won gold at previous competitions.





ACE stands for 'Aiming for a College Education' and the event endeavours to encourage secondary school pupils to consider higher education as an option for them.

During the morning, they discovered more about the courses they could do, played university 'Top Trumps' and heard real life experiences from student ambassadors.

Careers Guidance Officer, Mr Millar, said, "Pupils in Year 9 are just getting to the point when they are asked to think about what they might like to do as a career.

"Some may have a goal in mind and might not have realised that they need to do a degree to reach it, or they may think that there aren't any courses that would interest them.

"An informal event like ACE Day gives students the chance to ask questions and find out how accessible university courses are to them."

In the afternoon, students were given a tour of the campus by student ambassadors and asked to create a poster and slogan to market a particular university, using prospectuses as a reference.

The event had a very positive effect on students' opinions of university, with the majority who had not previously considered it, now thinking it could be an option for them.





Malet heads to No.10

On the first day of our last term for this school year, Year 8 student Harry, 13, travelled down to London with Assistant Headteacher Mr Logan on a very special school trip.

Harry was one of three students chosen to visit 10 Downing Street to meet the government's Enterprise Advisor Lord Young, to present an enterprise education game he has helped to design.

He was joined by Florrie, 10 from Gillshill Primary School, Harry, 14 from Sirius Academy, and representatives from Hull Youth Enterprise Partnership who organised the project.

All three schools had put forward a team of students to work on the board game with designers Engaging Education back in March, depicting how young people in Hull can progress from an idea to a working business with support from local organisations.

Lord Young declared it to be very impressive and even indicated that he'd like to take it to the Prime Minister and play a game with him.

Harry, who won the Badger's Sett Enterprise Challenge 2013 during Global Entrepreneurship Week last year, was delighted to be given the chance to visit the home of our Prime Minister.

He said, "Downing Street was amazing, it was so much bigger on the inside than it looks.

"It was such a great experience and I feel very proud to have been involved. It's not everyday you get to visit 10 Downing Street."



A group of Year 9 students were thrown in at the deep end of teaching after being asked to teach French to two Year 3 classes at Victoria Dock Primary School before half term

The six girls were asked to create lesson plans, activities and teaching aids to help them deliver a 45 minute lesson on either animals or family, in groups of three.

This task is to enable the students to achieve their 'Language Leaders' award, which they will be given during a ceremony later this year.

Languages teacher Mr Thompson said, "The pupils acted like true professionals today and showed off their superb linguistic skills.

"They proudly represented their school and I can certainly see some trainee teachers in the making, especially from their excellent delivery and patience under pressure. It was great to see Malet Lambert and Victoria Dock School working together once again in Modern Foreign Languages."

The pupils enthusiastically joined in with activities and listened attentively as our students taught them how to describe their pets and to say whether they like their little brother or not.

Olivia's subject focus for her team was 'family' and she enjoyed the interaction with the groups they were teaching.

She said, "We had to do a lot of preparation for these lessons, like practising what we were going to say, creating activity sheets and making sure our presentation was correct.

"I think we were all nervous beforehand but it's gone brilliantly. The children listened to what we said and responded really well. It was very enjoyable and I'd like to do it again."

Three winners have been announced for the English department's creative writing competition this term - a poem focusing on our City of Culture win earlier in the year.

Harry (Year 7), Callum (Year 8) and James (Year 9) were rewarded with a shopping voucher each for their creative efforts by English teacher, Mr Black.

He said, "I greatly enjoyed reading all the submissions and it was tough picking the winners - but they were well deserved!"

He said, "We were on holiday in Cayton Bay, it was raining really bad and we were looking for something to do.

"I remembered the competition from school so me and my dad sat down and wrote the poem about all the famous people of Hull. I didn't know I had won so I'm pretty pleased."



Belgium History Trip 2014

Just before the Easter holidays, students from Year 7 and Year 8 visited Belgium to learn more about World War 1.

The annual trip gave students the opportunity to visit some of the sites of war events they have been learning about in their history classes.

Trip organiser and history teacher Miss Binns found some of the students were taken aback at their experiences.

She said, "This trip is always hard-hitting for students because it helps them understand that what they learn about in textbooks really happened to people.

"Many students were shocked by the sheer scale of the cemeteries and many found names they recognised - there are 54,896 names on the Menin Gate alone.

"Pupils were particularly affected by the ages of some of the soldiers who were listed - one in particular, Private V Strudwick, was just 15 years old when he died, only a couple of years older than them.

"It's a wonderful, if sobering, way to bring history alive for them."

Amongst other attractions, students visited Tyne Cot, the largest Commonwealth Cemetery in the area, Langemark, the German cemetery for contrast, and laid a wreath on behalf of all the soldiers lost with no known grave at the Menin Gate ceremony, from all students at Malet Lambert.

They were also afforded an opportunity to place a wreath to commemorate a Hull hero, and an ex-pupil of Craven Street School, which is where Malet Lambert now stands.

John 'Jack' Harrison MC VC was an ex-Hull rugby player who was killed during an attack at Oppy, Pas-de-Calais. He was awarded a post-humous Victoria Cross for bravery after launching himself at a machine gun to protect the rest of his troop.

A plaque in his memory rests in the main hall of Malet Lambert School and also at the Arras Memorial.

Year 7 student Harry thoroughly enjoyed his time in Belgium and is itching to go again next year.

He said, "My favourite parts were visiting Tyne Cot and also being able to get in the trenches at the Somme Battlefield.

"Tyne Cot was quite important to me because I found out I had a great-great uncle who died in the war. He was only 17 years old at the time. We tried to find his name on the memorial but we couldn't see it there.

"World War 1 is a sad subject to study, especially when so many people died during it, but I really enjoyed being able to see some of the things we have talked about in lessons in real life.

"I'm hoping my mum and dad will let me go again next year."



Hull Book Awards 2014

Book-loving students were treated to a seminar with a bestselling author, in anticipation of the James Reckitt Hull Children's Book Awards, held at the Freedom Centre.

The five nominated authors for the Hull Book Award - C. J. Flood, Andy Mulligan, Alex Gutteridge, Tom Becker and Phil Earle - were touring the city's secondary schools promoting their books to the students who would be voting for them.

Alex Gutteridge, who wrote 'Young Adult' book Last Chance Angel, popped by for the afternoon to Malet Lambert to talk about her life, her creative processes and to answer questions from students.

She completed the session with a creative activity, where students had to come up with a word or feeling from looking at a picture, then create a story from all their ideas combined.

Alex said, "They've been a joy to talk to today, and this has been a lovely school to visit. They came up with some great ideas during the activity so I hope they enjoyed it too."

The following day, 13 students who help out with reading clubs and library duties went along to the Hull Book Awards, together with student representatives from schools across Hull.

After hearing speeches from each author and enjoying a sit down lunch, all pupils were invited to vote for their favourite book to win the prize.

The award went to C.J. Flood for her book Infinite Sky, a powerful, touching tale about a young girl in the midsts of a family breakdown who befriends a traveller boy.

Sports Day 2014









Students from Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 were on top form at this year's Sports Day, smashing several school records from as far back as 1989!

Over 360 students attended the annual event, held at Costello Stadium in West Hull. All competitors had qualified for their track and field events at a pre-Sports Day competition earlier in the month.

The day covered field events in long jump, triple jump, shot putt, discus and javelin, and track events in 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m and relay. Each competition was split into year group and gender.

Every time a student won an event their tutor group would collect points. At the end of the day, all points were collated to discover who would be crowned tutor group champion in each individual year.

During the field events in the morning, two new records were made:

Year 8 girls long jump Lauren 4.32m (previously 3.84m in 1993) Year 7 boys long jump James 4.49m (previously 4.41m in 2010)

After lunch, the sun truly came out and gave our competitors some very warm running conditions.

Leah from Year 8 broke the first record for girls 800m race, slashing three seconds off the previous best from 16 years ago.

When I started my Work Experience, I was pleasantly surprised with what the job entailed. I took photos and wrote stories about what is happening at my school on a daily basis and started to create a Year 6 student brochure to inform them about Year 7 life at Malet.

I took lots of photos of the new BTEC Art Sculptures and put them in a gallery on the school's website. I

also wrote an article called 'How to be Outstanding'. Outside of the office, I took photos of the school production, We Will Rock You, attended TeenTech with a group of Year 8 students, and represented the school media team at Hull Rounders Championships.

Finally, I took some photos of the IT rooms that we have at Malet so new students will be able to see what some of our classrooms are like.

Apart from myself, there are a few other students taking part in their work experience at Malet. These placements range from P.E., to I.T and to Art.

All of the placements are 'beneficial for the future' as they give the opportunity to have an insight into what their desired profession entails. There is a lot for these students to do inside of the school, and they will learn skills such as being independent and using their creativity to have a productive work experience.

Tiegan talks about her work experience in the P.E department, "I chose to do my work experience in P.E because I already do GCSE PE and I will get a bit of experience of what it's like to work with other people in the department.

"I hope to gain a lot of communication skills because I'll be working with a variety of people, such as staff

members and kids, which will benefit me in the future. I also hope to gain teamwork skills and how to teach people new things.

"In the future I would like to go to college and university and train to be a teacher and my work experience helps me because I'll be able to gain a lot of experience from what it's like to teach others and how to help students improve in the future as well."

I also asked Kate who is taking her work experience in the Art Department some questions and these were her responses:

"I chose Art because I want to either be an Art teacher or an Architect when I'm older and this placement will help me decide if it's what I want to do and also, help my achieve my goals.

I think I'll learn more independent skills but also teamwork because I'll be working with other people doing their work experience in Art too."

Personally, I hope to gain more people skills and have a more detailed insight into what goes on behind the scenes of the website and running of Malet on a daily basis.



Elsewhere...at Shield Security

Year 10 students Bradley and James were sent to Shield Security as part of their work experience.

They so impressed company director David Frank, that he emailed school to say they were a pleasure to have and he wished he could have had them for longer to see more of what they could do.

Bradley and James were pleasantly surprised by how much they got out of their time at Shield Security.

Bradley said, "Overall my week at Shield Security has gave me lots of experience and gave me a wider

knowledge of what I wanted to do and what the working world is like. The staff made the working environment very welcoming".

James said, "Shield Security sounded as though it would give me more experience and broader options than some of the other workplaces I could go to.

"I didn't really know what to expect because I didn't entirely know what I'd be doing, but I have really enjoyed it because I have learnt things like how to use software called Logosoft which helps manage their staff."



Year 8 tackle TeenTech

On the 10th July, a small group of Year 8's set out to the KC stadium for the annual 'TeenTech' event. Students used their STEM (Science Technology Engineering Maths) skills to apply themselves to different situations and solving problems.

A range of businesses were at the event and they all had their different stalls and activities for over 200 12-13 year olds to participate in throughout the day which would test their abilities to the maximum.

From disabling a 'bomb' to building bridges, the event offered a huge amount of interactivity for the pupils, making the excitement increase by adding prizes, from as little as a certificate, to a JVC Boom blaster and an iPod touch.

The first event of the day was construction, which saw the girls' team finding out how 'STEM' properties could be applied within the real world and after their discussion, they had to answer questions about their new taught knowledge and when they got the answer right, they were handed a piece of a jigsaw puzzle, applying their construction skills.

Afterwards, they entered a different room which saw them creating an 'egg rover' that would have to hold an egg and drop it from a height without the egg cracking. One out of the four teams managed to create basket like carriers that prevented the egg from

cracking, beating two other student teams and even a teachers team too.

The girls then went to an events room which held approximately 16 different companies that were showcasing what they could do and what skills are necessary.

The girls were given a rota and enjoyed speaking to people who told them more about where their newfound 'STEM' skills come into different situations, including being in the army, creating modern technology at JVC, and making 'windmills' for a chocolate bar.

This event happened until lunch, where the final ideas for the ideas wall were placed. The ideas had to be about something that could either improve life or make their current life better. The winner of this would receive an IPod touch so the stakes were high.

After lunch, Malet's students were tested against other schools' students to make any app that they want. They ranged from healthy eating apps to games where you could 'bite Suarez back'. The 12-13 year olds pitched their ideas at the end of the 30 minute creating time, having just 60 seconds to persuade the app designers to choose theirs as the winning one.

After every team in the room had pitched, all groups were re-united to see who won the prizes of all events, which saw Talitha Marshall who beat a KC employee at Mario Kart, winning a £10 Amazon
