Pupil Leadership Team announced

Head Boy and Head Girl for next academic year at Malet Lambert have been announced as Year 10 pupils Jacob and Yasmin, with Evie and Thomas taking on the roles of deputy heads.

Sixteen candidates from Year 10 put themselves forward for the roles, and took part in a whole day selection process.

All candidates scored well but the top four were so close that Head of School, Mr Sprakes, decided to create deputy head positions for Evie and Thomas.

Mr Sprakes said: "The competition to become our next Head Boy and Head Girl this year was huge. We had a total of 16 candidates, all with wonderful qualities.

"The pupils were judged on eight activities, involving a number of staff, pupils and governors. The activity that makes me particularly proud is the presentation to staff.

"We understand it can be quite daunting, but being a competent public speaker is key to the

role. All of the pupils did a fantastic job, the staff were wowed and the ranking decision was extremely difficult."

All pupils had to put forward their vision for the school, amongst which were proposals to increase funding for extracurricular clubs, provide counselling sessions for pupils, and stress management classes.

Yasmin and Jacob were both delighted to have been chosen to take on this role.

Yasmin said, "This is completely unexpected but I'm very pleased. Everyone performed so well. It really could have been anyone's game."

Jacob was equally honoured, commenting, "I'm glad to be leading a great arrangement of pupils at Malet Lambert. I'm particularly proud to have come this far through a difficult selection process."

Pupils in cooking classes made a variety of healthy meals and snacks to serve to pupils and staff during break time, including banana and blueberry muffins, vegetable spring rolls, and super food fruit crumble pots.

The week's final activity had to be slightly postponed due to a timetable change, but during the Festival of Nations enrichment day the following week, pupils learned how to make healthy 'Chinese-style' meals.

Five pupils selected for new rugby league team

Five pupils have been chosen from Malet Lambert to be part of the City of Hull Academy U16 rugby league team.

Rugby scouts from City of Hull Academy – a fusion of both Hull FC and Hull KR - attended local matches to seek out talented youngsters to join the team.

After identifying players that impressed, pupils had to attend further training with Hull KR and Hull FC coaches for final selection.

Jacob, Adam, Archie, Charlie, and Bailey from Year 9 were all chosen, alongside 10 other pupils from various schools in the region.

Bailey, who plays for Skirlough Bulls, said, "All of us want to be professional players, so this is just the beginning of it all."

Archie, who plays for West Hull RLFC, said, "I feel really proud to have been picked for this opportunity."

The five boys all train with Hull FC and KR coaches at school, alongside City of Hull Academy training at Bishop Burton College twice a week, plus training for their own individual teams.

The aim behind the academy, which also runs an U19 team, is to create a pool of local talent to feed the main local rugby league teams.

The City of Hull Academy will play other national academy teams in a super league for the younger generation, with matches starting later in the year.

However, two of the chosen Malet pupils decided to transfer to a rival team – Castleford Tigers.

This means that when the new season starts, the pupils will be playing against each other.

Bailey said, "It'll be weird playing each other, but useful because we know each other's weak spots. City of Hull will clearly be the best team though."

The pupils have already had much success as part of the school's Year 9 rugby team, most recently winning the Sky Try Rugby League Festival without conceding a try.

Eagle house soars to victory

This year marks our first Sports Day at school as part of a house system.

At the end of June, pupils were allocated to their houses in special assemblies, collecting a coloured t-shirt and a new tie in house colours.

For the first time at Sports Day, all pupils came off timetable for the afternoon to take part in a whole school event and cheer on their house.

Pupils were seated in their houses – Rose, Chevron, Eagle, Lion, Bluejay and Crown – wearing their house colours, around the edge of the athletics track.

Many had brought in mascots, painted their faces and made huge banners to support their house.

The atmosphere was electric as pupils shouted and cheered for their teams as they raced around the track during the different events, including 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m and the relay.

Each time a pupil won a race, they were given points for their house. As points accumulated, a winning house started to emerge.

Two houses in general were vying for the top spot – Eagle and Lion – but halfway through the event a winner became very clear.

Eagle house soared to victory with 568 points, and Head of House, Mr Midgley, did a victory dance for the crowds.

Year 10 House Captain for Lion, Keegan, commented, “The atmosphere was amazing. Being in our houses made each group of pupils more competitive, and brought a better vibe to the day.

“I’m excited for future house events and hopefully I can take part too and achieve for my fellow Lions.”

Pupils competed in variety of field and track events during the day, with some even breaking school records.

Year 7 pupil Katie from Bluejay broke both the long jump and the 400m school records, which were set in 2015.



The Big Malarkey

Year 7 pupils were invited to take part in the Big Malarkey in July, Hull's first children's literature festival, in East Park.

The theme of the visit was 'jeopardy' and how it makes a story more interesting.

Author Bali Rai spoke at length about how he incorporates jeopardy into his novels, and pupils had the chance to write their own gripping opening chapter to a book and read them out in front of the group.

They also tried out a variety of other activities, based around literature and the spoken word.

Poet, Adisa, shared poems with the audience and encouraged them to write their own in the form of a 'cinquain' - a poem of five lines with a set number of syllables per line.

Other groups worked on storyboarding, illustration, dramatic portraits, and group drama.

The festival aimed to engage young people with reading, writing and drama in a number of different ways..



Racing to the finish

More than 2,000 people saw Malet Lambert race their electric kit car around Hull's KCOM Stadium in July, alongside 66 other vehicles.

The race was organised by Greenpower Education Trust as part of Project Blyth, whose objective is to advance education in the subjects of sustainable engineering and technology to young people.

Budding engineers from Malet Lambert have been building their car from scratch for the past year.

They joined 32 other teams at KCOM to race their car and came in at a very respectable 9th place.

The team of nine pupils had to design, build and race their vehicle, with the help of mentors from Hull Raceway.

Local firm Paintwork Express also offered all paint and body work free of charge to our team, to give them that professional finish.

Year 9 pupil Tyler commented, "We're hoping that if we get to be involved in this project again next year, we'll be able to do even better, after everything we've learned with our mentors this year."

Year 9 pupil Nicole said, "It was a great experience and we worked really well as a team together."



Boxing clever

A Year 7 pupil has just been crowned Junior European Open Champion after a boxing competition in Ireland.



Owen is an amateur boxer and often heads back into school with visible injuries from his matches.

In this most recent match, he stopped his opponent in the first round of the final, but still came out of it sporting a black eye.

He has had a very busy season, including winning the Yorkshire Amateur Boxing Association (ABA) Championship title, and also the National ABA Minors Championship title. Owen is only the second minor in Hull to ever hold that title.

Following on from this, he also won the Hull Box Cup, an international three-day event.

Discovering our local industries

Fifteen pupils with an interest in science and engineering headed to Associated British Ports (ABP) in Hull, to find out more about careers and training programmes there.

The visitors were greeted by the team and given a talk on health and safety at the venue, and told about some of the things they have to deal with on a daily basis at a busy port.

The focus of the first part of the day was looking at native and non-native species .

An important job for staff at ABP is ensuring that they protect our country from any invading flora and fauna that arrive as part of a cargo from all parts of the world.

Non-native species that come to our country can upset the balance of our country's habitat, such as Japanese Knotweed and Giant Hogweed.

Some of these will be known shipments and may be sent to quarantine. However, some may come attached to the side of a ship or hidden in cargo.

These must be then identified and dealt with.

Part of this is ensuring that biodiversity surveys are completed of the area surrounding the ports to identify any rogue non-native species that may have been missed.

Pupils were tasked with exploring the embankment to take photos of any types of insect, animal and plant they could find.

During the afternoon, pupils in teams had to identify all the plants and animals in their photos, ready to be catalogued.

Following this, they were given a presentation on careers and training available at ABP, with many pupils commenting that they hadn't realised it was such a diverse company.

ABP offers training and apprenticeships in a variety of areas from age 16.



Piano masterclass

It was lovely to welcome renowned professional pianist, Richard Meyrick, to our school earlier in the term.

He visited to lead a piano masterclass which focused on critical analysis of some of our own pianists from Year 8 & 9.

He assessed their good and bad points and gave some constructive criticism to help them improve.

Year 10 Taster Days

Year 10 pupils had a chance to visit both Wilberforce College and Hull College to try out further education courses.

This is an annual visit which aims to help pupils with their college applications during the following year.

Among the courses available to try were criminology, engineering, hair & beauty, sports, business & IT, public services and science.
