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

Term Summary

I can say with certainty that this last term has been full of excitement! I am ecstatic to announce that myself and Sam have been promoted to Head Pupils in light of our work as Deputy Head Pupils; on behalf of us both I'll say that we are both looking-forward to working alongside Ashby and Sadie in the Head Pupil role.

Earlier in March, Miss Ridley welcomed back the Prison Me No Way team to educate Year 9 pupils (as well as the Year 11 sociology groups) on risk-taking and the consequences of poor decisions.

Miss Ridley said, "It was an excellent day for all involved. All pupils also had the opportunity to listen to the stories of the two serving prisoners, and to consider the impacts of dangerous driving and getting involved in county lines on people's lives, among other things. The Prison Me No Way team said they were very impressed with the attitude, politeness and intelligence of Malet Lambert pupils. We look forward to seeing them again next year."

Similarly, Miss Ridley and Miss Genter led an enlightening meeting with parents to discuss Malet Lambert's anti-bullying policies. I had the pleasure of attending this and I found it interesting to listen to a parent's point of view as well as adding a pupil's point of view myself.

International Women's Day

Each summer, a new cohort of Head Pupils are elected to represent Feminism: the advocacy and empowerment of women on the basis of gender equality. Our society, this school, and our future is overflowing with passionate, inspiring and flourishing feminists.

At Malet Lambert, pupils are encouraged to express their beliefs and in light of international Women's Day, it is only fitting that we celebrate all the strong women in our lives.

Our history is rich in noteworthy women who have fought for freedom and liberation for every gender. So, let's go back to when it all began in Great Britain, women's suffrage really took off in the late 1800s, specifically, the WSPU was founded by the infamous Emily Pankhurst and continued into the 1900s as women fought for their right to vote.

This is not to say influential women didn't come before the suffrage movement, strong women even arose in ancient Greek mythology. Take the great goddess of war, Athena for example. Whether it was through peaceful protests or by causing utter anarchy, these women demanded to be heard! Emily Davidson even threw herself under the king's horse at the Epsom Derby in 1913 to make a public challenge to the patriarchy.

Emily Pankhurst once said, "You must make women count as much as men. You must have an equal standard of morals; and the only way to enforce that is through giving women political power so that you can get that equal moral of standard registered in the laws of the country. It is the only way."

I think it's important that we continue this legacy so that women can thrive no matter how they choose to live. Equally, many influential women across the world followed in the footsteps of the suffrage movement. Like Marie Curie, of Polish-French descent, who was a twice Nobel prize winner for her career in STEM. Perhaps more recently, Emma Watson, first seen on the big screen playing the clever, witty and eternally fierce Hermione Granger is now known for her excellent feminist speeches as a prominent female activist of the modern day.

This term we celebrated international Women's Day, and this month we celebrate National Black Women's history month. For me, international Women's Day celebrates, praises and empowers all women. International Women's Day praises our role in society, it advocates for a woman's right to choice in all areas of her life. Although it is a celebration, International Women's Day shines light upon how society fails women and how the patriarchy benefits nobody, not even men. In a society that has become reliant on female oppression, women decide to disassociate themselves with feminism because it can become synonymous with 'man-hating'. This isn't the case at all.

The empowerment of females doesn't mean the weakening of males. Feminism is the fight against gender inequality and gender stereotypes. It says women deserve equal pay whilst allowing men to have the freedom to be vulnerable. Feminism is an essential organ in our society, the lack of feminism would be the lack of kindness, fairness, equality, it would be repression.

I think it is important to address that a feminist doesn't wear a uniform, some wear suits and briefcases, others wear maternity dresses and carry around nappies, some are uncaring and others are full compassion.

In an interview, Serena Williams (American tennis legend) said, "Since I was a little girl, I've dreamed of being the best tennis player in the world... but I also dreamed of having a family. The dream was not divided-it was to be successful in both arenas".

This quote embodies the essence of International Women's day; women shouldn't have to work twice as hard as a man to earn a pay cheque, the same way shouldn't be viewed as 'weak' for having feelings.


World Book Day

Cup Final Victory for Malet

On 17th March, our Year 8 girls rugby team to play their postponed Yorkshire Cup matches in Castleford.

The first match saw the girls come up against Farnley, who our team also played in last year's Yorkshire cup final and national semi-final. In a very close game Malet, Lambert won out 10-4 with tries from Lilly B and Anya J.

In the 2nd game the team played against Archbishop Holgate where they were the comfortable winners, scoring 24-4 with tries from Lilly B, Maria E and three tries from Caitlin M.

In the final group game against Brooksbank and the team once again secured victory, winning 20-0, with tries from Ava S, Maria E and Lilly B.

These results meant that the girls went on to play the Castlford High in the semi-finals, with Malet coming out on top, winning 20-4 in the end.

These amazing victories meant that the team moved on to the Yorkshire final. On the 28th March, the team competed in this years Yorkshire Final against Trinity Academy Leeds at Featherstone rovers stadium. While the weather conditions were less than favourable, with wind and rain pouring down, the team open an early lead with Maria E scoring the first try with Caitlin M securing the conversion.

Malet scored the next points through Emily F scoring in the corner and Caitlin M, once again, making the conversion.

After some push back from Trinity Academy, the score going into half time was 18 - 10 to Malet Lambert.

The second half saw Trinity Academy equalise with Malet Lambert, bringing the score to 18 - 18, but thanks to a final try in the last half of extra time from Lily B, Malet Lambert managed to retain the trophy and keep the title of Yorkshire champions for the second year in a row.

Overall, the final was an immense display of rugby skill from our Year 8s, who overcame the poor weather and last minute subsitions to prove, once again, that they are champions.
